Presidents's Report 2023-2024

As I began to write this report I spent quite a deal of time reflecting on what has been achieved by the Club members over the past twelve months. We have certainly met the brief of Service and Advocacy – working in a collaborative way to deliver a better world for women and girls.

The year began with a "Zonta Spirit" exercise and the results of this have guided our journey throughout the year. It's very useful to understand what is important about Zonta for our individual members.

In May most of our members attended the very informative Area Workshop. The keynote speakers were:-

DR FARIBA BENIA-WILLIAMSON who is the founder of FBW Gynaecology Plus in Adelaide, providing a women-centred approach to care, alongside a team of dedicated and skilled medical professionals. She is the founder of Desert Flower Australia, which supports victims of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM). Her passion is working towards a better quality of life and empowerment through her practice and research. We learnt so much from Dr Fariba including that FGM and the repercussions of is occurring here in SA.

DR SARAH MOULDS is a senior lecturer in law UniSA: Justice + Society and co-founder of the Rights Resource Network SA. Sarah is an executive member of the International Parliamentary Engagement Network, an Expert Advisor to the Queensland Parliament and cares deeply about promoting equality and dignity through the law. Dr Moulds has inspired further work by our Advocacy team to address Human Rights legislation in SA.

In the past year we raised funds for our Baby Basket project; AFFLIP – supporting girls to stay at school: Malvern Place – supporting young mums with filing systems and decorative household goods; Dr Luc and the Impact Radio Program in the Congo; Provided money to purchase school uniforms for girls attending Lorubae Junior Secondary School in Isiol, Kenya and the ZONTA says NO toilet door project. We also continued to fund the Birthing Kit and Breast Cushion Projects.

In July, the Area Workshop focused on Homelessness and Older Women. "A Roof over my Head." This devasting issue is on the increase and it was great for us to hear about efforts are being made to address this issue locally. As a result of the workshop a cross-organisation working party has been formed. Recently the YMCA has begun a \$15m building project on Hutt Street to provide low-income housing for women.

"Camilla Louise" Sustainable Fashions Parade took place in August and what a memorable and successful event it was. Driven by our Vice-President, Jenni Foreman, this parade is designed to remind us that great fashion can be recycled. It is in keeping with the "Zonta says Now" programme. The work involved in planning, putting together and delivering this event is enormous and I thank every friend of and Zontian who contributed.

The need to continually raise the profile of Zonta is foremost in our minds and as a Club this has been an important focus for us. We have increased our social media profile, worked collaboratively with other organisations such as NCWSA and Rotary and continued to build a strong working relationship with Burnside Council. Carol Pearce and I have undertaken a public speaking role aimed at promoting the work of Zonta.

Domestic Violence continues to be a major scourge in our society, and we work hard to draw public attention to the gravity of the situation. Each year we participate in the 16 Days of Activism. This year we many of us marched (some for the first time in their lives) through the city wearing **bright orange** – it was very impressive! This is not just a women's issue. It is time for men stand up and declare abhorrence at such behaviour. I am pleased to see that Allegra Spender stood up in parliament recently and <u>urged the Prime Minister to speak to men about domestic violence</u>. We must confront DV from the top down and from the bottom up.

The Bunbury Conference was a highlight for me – my first Zonta Conference. Many new learnings were acquired, and contacts made. I am really looking forward to attending the International Conference in June in Brisbane.

Our Club lost two very special ladies in recent times – Joan Moller and Annie Marsden. Both were very committed Zontians and we remember them fondly.

In closing I thank all the amazing women who are members of our club. I am in awe of their commitment, knowledge, skills and generosity. It is a privilege to lead them.

16 Days of Activism



This year we planned to be highly visible and draw attention to the very serious issue of Domestic Violence. Our centre piece was a display of 57 pairs of shoes, all sprayed orange – one pair for every woman who died in Australia because of DV in the previous year. It was quite a statement and caused many people to stop and reflect. We worked closely with the City of Burnside to put on the display which was published in social and regular media. Many of our members also joined with Rotary and other Zonta Clubs to march through the City of Adelaide – culminating in a rally at the Torrens Parade Ground. Again, the

event drew significant media attention. Sadly, the rate of Domestic Violence continues to increase and must become a "Whole of Society "conversation.

A Roof over my Head:

Actions not Words

A very informative workshop was well attended by Club members on 29th July. The Advocacy committee organised an excellent range of speakers who shared their thoughts about what is happening and what is needed to address the major issues surrounding homelessness and older women.

- Dr Victoria Cornell Churchill Fellowship "Study of Alternate Housing Solutions"
 Victoria studied homelessness initiatives overseas and the benefits of mixed aged and socio economic housing. Victoria is currently working at Onkaparinga Council.
- Bridget Mather (ZC Adelaide) "Sharing with Friends" Bridget spoke about this
 interesting Zonta initiative happening in Queensland. More information about this
 project can be found online.
- Helen Sands (ZC Gawler) "Gawler Community Housing Project" Helen spoke about the well-established community housing model in Gawler and how it is changing to meet current needs.
- Leann Symonds (ZC Victor Harbour) "Local Government Toolkit for Ending Homelessness" Leann spoke about the role of local government and how homelessness is everyone's business.
- Joy O'Hazy spoke about the role of Habitat for Humanity and what they are doing here in South Australia, helping people to rebuild, renovate and develop sustainable housing. They are hoping to work with Women's Shelters to build houses.



Information from the workshop was actioned by forming a group of 7 attendees who will draft a submission to State and Federal governments, putting forward the view that there must be a National Housing Strategy. The guest speakers were willing to support the committee members in the preparation of the submission.

The day gave us lots of food for thought and action.

St Andrews by the Sea

Australian Foundation for Learning in the Philippines (AFFLIP)

The Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens (ZCAT) currently provides scholarships for ten girls in schools in Davao City in The Philippines. These scholarships are aimed at keeping students, whose families cannot afford to keep them in school past year three, at school until year 6. The scholarships provide the girls with uniforms, books, opportunities for excursions and access to the feeding programme.

AFFLIP was established eleven years ago. It supports fifteen schools by providing literacy and mathematics training for teachers, reading libraries, outdoor playgrounds, gardens that teach children about growing their own food as well as contributing to the feeding programme, fishponds to ensure more food.

ZCAT has now enabled thirty three girls to complete their primary education. Those who have moved on after year 6 have continued their education in high school. This education not only supports the girls in obtaining future employment; it also contributes money and opportunities for other family members.

Craigmore High School

As the textiles teacher from the Northern Area Senior College retired and the programme was not continued we needed to find another home for the sewing machines, material and patterns that were being donated. We have developed a close relationship with the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks and one of their members is a teacher who works at Craigmore High school where they have a large textiles programme. So, we have now been contributing significant amounts of the afore-mentioned goods to the school. These have been very gratefully received.

Malvern Place

This marvellous support programme run by Centacare supports women aged 25 and under who are pregnant or have small children and are homeless, often leaving domestic violence situations. The women are provided with accommodation and support while they are finding housing.

ZCAT provides baby baths filled with a wide range of baby needs for each pregnant woman. The baths contain such items as nappies, rugs, toys and books, bibs and gro-suits.

ZCAT also contributes concertina files filled with a diary, notebook, stationery, pens, pencils, highlighters and other useful support materials that provide for the women to file their paperwork and keep appointments. Barefoot Investor books are also provided and staff members work with women to learn financial management skills.

During the past year a children's co-ordinator has been added to the staff at Malvern Place. The has encouraged ZCAT members and friends to contribute children's furniture, toys, books and making materials that can be used in the children's programme.

Our members have also begun contributing a range of home accessories that create a homely feel to the apartments provided for the women. These have included linen, cushions, lamps, candles, ornaments and platters.

Equipment and Radio Programs for women in Eastern DR Congo



Supporting local radio programs in eastern DR Congo has been a long term project for the Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens. Dr Luc, the Director of MHCD, a charity based in Uvira Territory in eastern DR Congo, lives in South Australia, and we have responded to his calls for help for the women his charity serves.

On-going sexual violence, especially in remote areas where no police stations exist, has characterised the area.

The local community radio station is *Impact Radio*. It was created, and is managed and supported by, MHCD (Mission in Health Care and Development). *Impact Radio* broadcasts to the entire Uvira Territory, consisting of millions of people, sending out health and safety messages for women, running talkback radio programs and keeping women connected. When danger is near women ring the radio station and spread the word, protecting whole communities from danger and enabling women to defend themselves again rape.

MHCD provides women with phones to communicate with the station. They call in messages and speak on the radio, detailing imminent danger, asking questions and connecting girls and women to crucial and much needed services.

This year our funds allowed MHCD to buy 10 Motorola Phones at a total cost of \$450USD. Community leaders received the phones, women responsible for community development and protection. The phones allow them to call the nearest police or other locals who can help them if they are in trouble. The phones don't rely on uncertain connections or phone credit to work, they are reliable and secure. The Motorola phones cover 30 square kilometres without credit so the women can call *Impact Radio* free of charge, avoiding the risks involved in walking many kilometres to get a connection. Two phones went to women leaders in the villages of Munanira, Kasaba, Mulenge and Kanenge.

Two phones were allocated to Impact Radio for the journalists to use. These women are also midwives who work at MHCD's Hospital in Luvungi, so they are also providing support services during difficult deliveries.

MHCD reports that, in December 2023 alone, the phones allowed them to rescue 4 women in Munanira, 2 in Kasaba and 1 in Kanenge. Dr Luc thanks the Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens for its on-going support.

Lorubae Primary School – Kenya

Lorubae is a public primary school in Samburu East, Kenya which we visited in February 2023. The school is in a very poor country area and services day students and boarders. The boarders are predominantly students who are considered "at risk" in their own communities and are kept at school to keep them safe. Most of the families only send their children to school because they are provided with food.

The headmaster, Moses Kagema, identified the following opportunities to improve girl child welfare and education in the school:

- Repairing the girl's toilets and bathrooms
- Providing uniforms and sanitary towels to needy girls especially young mothers who
 have decided to come back to school.
- Repairing and purchasing more classroom desks.
- Extending the kitchen garden to produce more green vegetables to supplement the maize based diet.
- Erecting a water tower and installation of a big water tank to improve water supply to the girl's dormitory and toilets.

As a pilot project in 2023 we provided funding to the school to purchase uniforms for the most at-risk girls in the school because without a school uniform they are not permitted to attend school. Our support contributed to providing new uniforms for 50 girls attending the school, but more importantly enabled the school to run an outreach program with the families and local community to educate the community about looking after their girls, care of the new uniforms and the importance of working hard to provide other educational needs for their children. The family members were also encouraged to show genuine concern in the lives of their girls.


This project has had a significant impact on these girls and is supporting them to continue their education journey. Letters of thanks were received from four of the girls (see below).

Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens Says NOW with sustainable fashion

To engage women across four generations about sustainable fashion, the Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens Inc, Australia, held two Camilla Louise fashion parades, with the most recent event held in August.

With attendees aged 1 to 93-years-old, the events aligned with Zonta Says NOW to Gender-Equal Climate Action and created an impact activity, which led to greater visibility of the club and connecting with community members previously unaware of Zonta.

Like many others, the club's membership is aging and declining. Therefore, it is crucial to have greater visibility and community engagement to attract the next generation of women dedicated to empowering women and girls. One way the club achieved this goal is by organizing an event focusing on sustainability and climate action, which can help attract younger members.

The event was enjoyed by 70 guests and 30 volunteers of a multi-generational modeling team and the catering team.

The club achieved the following goals:

- 1. Raised the profile of Zonta within their community.
- Demonstrated the beauty and value in recycled clothing as a Zonta Says NOW to gender-equal climate action.
- 3. Fostered positive friendships.
- 4. Facilitated self-development for women of all ages.
- 5. Showed fashion for women of all ages and body shapes and promoted a positive body image message.
- 6. Offered women the opportunity to stretch their comfort zones.
- 7. Fundraised for service projects.

Every time women get together to advocate for other women, then, by default, the club is building a better place for women and girls.

As Zontians, the club believes that is what they do now, what they have done in the past and what they will continue to do into the future so that the world does not hand down gender inequities to daughters and granddaughters.

Treasurer's Report

Over the year the club's income and expenditure was very close to budget with one major exception. Member Joan Moller, who died in during last year, and whose life was celebrated in a special afternoon tea held for Zonta members and friends, remembered the club in her will and left a legacy of \$5,000.00.

The club decided to invest the \$5,000 in a Term Deposit with the income to be paid out as a special allocation to a Zonta cause which is yet to be decided. She also bequeathed her jewelry and the money raised from its sale. To date this has garnered \$1,450.00.

It is a very beautiful gift that Joan has left the club, and it reminds us of Joan's dedication as a member. Joan remained a committed Zontian over her last year despite being unable to attend meetings.

Our largest fundraiser during the year was the Camilla Louise Fashion Parade directed and manage by Jenni Foreman, which netted an income of almost exactly \$5,000.00.
