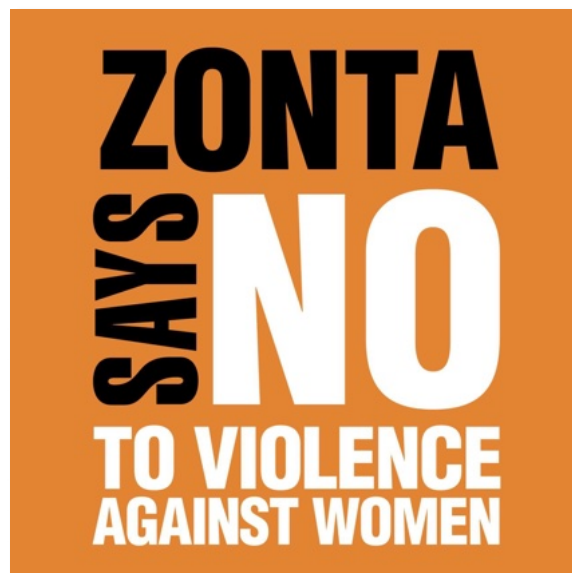

Presidents's Report 2025-2026

It has been an exceptionally busy, productive, and rewarding period for our Club, marked by strong collaboration, meaningful advocacy, and vibrant community engagement. I am pleased to share highlights of our recent activities and achievements.

Leadership, Governance and Representation

I have actively represented our Club across a range of meetings and forums, including the NCWSA 16 Days of Activism, joint organisations, planning meetings, NCWSA meetings, Area 2 Advocacy discussions, and leadership gatherings. These opportunities continue to strengthen our connections and ensure our Club remains aligned with broader strategic priorities.

We have met all governance requirements, including lodging updated Club Management information, our Annual Report to Zonta International and District 23, and submitting required program updates. Ongoing work to ensure compliance with Zonta International rules remains a priority.

Advocacy and Community Engagement

Advocacy continues to be a strong focus for our Club. Participation in NCWSA and Area 2 meetings has enabled us to contribute to important discussions, including initiatives such as the Vinnies "Homeshare" program supporting women aged 55+.

We also remain engaged with key developments in domestic violence prevention, including government responses to the Royal Commission. These insights will inform our future advocacy efforts and programming. Domestic Violence remains a significant scourge on society.

We have established a vital link with Malvern Place and Centacare. Through individuals' generosity we have supplied furniture, homewares and bedding.

Partnerships and Service Activities

Our partnerships with local organisations remain vital. We have built a strong relationship with City of Burnside. We also strengthened connections through collaboration with Rotary

and other community groups, including participation in events such as the Bunnings Rotary BBQ and Walk for Respect.

Events and Club Activities

Our annual “Sip and Shop” event is always a highlight on the calendar. This sustainable fashion event fits neatly with the Zonta says Now focus.

The Milpinti Gallery opening was a standout event, showcasing the strength of our teamwork and community spirit. The event was warmly received and created valuable new connections.

Other successful initiatives included:

- The Birthing Kit workshop
- Eco Threads event
- Pearl jewellery workshops fostering creativity and connection
- A highly successful combined Amelia Earhart event, raising funds for the Amelia Earhart Fellowship

Planning is well underway for future events, including Area workshops, Advocacy initiatives, and the BFKA 20th anniversary celebration.

Programs and Awards

We have continued to promote and support key Zonta programs. Our club funds scholarships for young girls in the Philippines through AFFLIP. We also sent money to the Congo for training nurses. The Young Women in Leadership Award promotes active leadership for young women and this year our winner was Mary Tyrer, a Year 11 student at Scotch College.

We also celebrated outstanding achievements within our community, including recognition of members and nominations for District awards.

Collaboration and Future Planning

Encouraging collaboration between Clubs remains a key focus, with plans for joint events and shared initiatives already in progress. The need to qualify for charity status must be a future priority. The Area 2 Leadership meetings have built a vital support network between Clubs.

Member Engagement and Development

It has been wonderful to see members actively engaged across all activities—from service projects and events to leadership discussions and training sessions. Attendance at leadership and new member meetings has helped build capability and strengthen our Club for the future. Six members attended the District Conference in Devonport, and this was a wonderful opportunity to get to know each other in a different environment.

Looking Ahead

As we move forward, our focus remains on:

- Strengthening advocacy impact

- Expanding community partnerships
- Encouraging leadership within our membership
- Delivering meaningful programs and events

This report concludes my three years as President of our club, and it has been a privilege. I extend my sincere thanks to all members for your enthusiasm, commitment, and willingness to contribute. Your collective efforts are what make our Club such a dynamic and impactful organisation.

Zonta District 23 Conference Devonport 5th – 7th September Report

“Sustainability, Spirit and Standing Up for Human Rights”

The Devonport Conference drew together approximately 130 fellow Zontians and it was a great experience to share with Lisa, Rebecca, Jan, Pauline, Grace and Jenni from our club.

The Conference was held in a perfect space – Paranaple Convention Centre in the centre of Devonport and I must commend the Zonta Club of Devonport for excellent organisation. All sessions flowed seamlessly.



The opening included a Welcome to Country followed by the Flag Parade – which is always an impressive spectacle. Sandra Burns – Past District Governor led this. The Hon Jo Palmer opened the Conference, and she was followed by Professor Kate Warner – a former Tasmanian Governor, lawyer and academic. Kate delivered a compelling address about standing up for Human Rights.

The Business sessions were conducted very smoothly, with very little discussion. 42 delegates waving green cards signalling support were the flavour of the day. NO RED cards were waved in the air.



The Birthing Kit resolution was addressed by Julie Monis-Ivett, discussed, wording slightly modified and was passed unanimously. This means that the resolution will now be presented at ZI Convention in Vancouver.

The nominating committee did a very thorough job in presenting an outstanding slate of candidates.

The guest speakers were very engaging. Catelyn Richards and Dr Jane Sargison spoke to the sustainability theme. Jane graduated from Uni and worked on the hydro scheme in Tasmania in times when it was tough to be a woman in that position. We laughed we she told us that they sent her down inside the big pipes because she was small! Jane went onto work on jet plane engines for Rolls Royce in UK. She now oversees sustainable housing developments in Tasmania.

Nicolette Chen – Zonta Women in Business winner and Lilly Correll – Young Women in Leadership winner gave wonderful speeches that made me feel that the future is bright! I

hope that we can encourage these young women and their friends to remain connected to Zonta.



Christine Dersch from Germany, represented ZI at the Conference and I was given great hope with her words. ZI is modernising and the thinking is more in line with our modern world. Several small presentations brought us up to date with ZI workings/ funding including the Foundation.

Three learning cafes covered Advocacy – lead by Jenni Foreman; Unlocking Club Success – which I attended, and Climate Emergency Preparedness Planning – led by Carol Theobold.

The Conference recognised many individuals and clubs who have made outstanding contributions during the biennium. These included Birthing Kit Champions; Years of Membership; Visibility and Sustainability. Heide Talyor recipients are Jo Wittorff and Dawn Newman – women who have given outstanding service to Zonta. A poignant moment is always when we recognise those who have passed with the “Ceremony of Remembrance” - I placed a yellow rose for Annie Marsden.

Sunday keynote speaker was Lisa Blair – solo woman sailor. What a woman she is! I heard Lisa speak in Brisbane but hearing her again was just as inspirational. This time she also focused on the microplastics that are in the ocean – even around Antarctica. Her yacht is called Climate Action Now. I highly recommend reading her books.

Carol Theobold gave a thought proving talk “Zonta says Now” Carol encouraged us all to take small steps to help preserve the environment.

Throughout the Conference we ran our Market Stall. This is a great way to chat to fellow attendees, and I thank all our members who were very diligent in running the Stall – bringing home much need funds!

The social connection at Conference is good and I enjoyed several visits to the Irish Pub and the Conference Dinner was a highlight too!

I had a very inspiring trip to Devonport and came home full of ideas! The District 23 Board – led by Debbie did a great job planning and overseeing the running of the Conference.

ROYAL COMMISSION INTO DOMESTIC, FAMILY AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE

Advocacy plays a very important role and function within the Club. We have been following and attending workshops post the release of the Royal Commission findings in August 2025. The Government has identified key findings that they believe organisations including Zonta can play a vital role in. These include a service clubs united voice to challenge the condoning of gender-based violence and engaging men to promote positive masculinities and supportive male relationships.



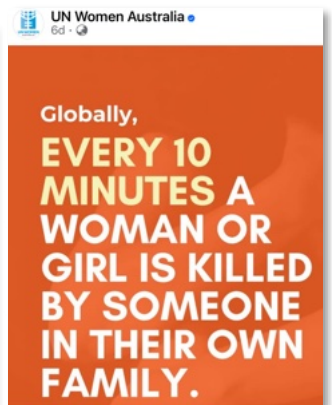

We have been busy this year supplying 10 baskets since May 25 - 9 to Malvern Place and 1 to a young mum referred to us by a friend who works at Food Bank.

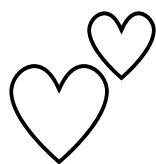
People have been generous in their donations, and the baths have been full to overflowing. Thank you to those who made donations.

Malvern Place

Malvern Place is a facility provided by Centacare, It supports young pregnant women and single mothers in their transition towards independence by providing:

- medium to long term supported accommodation for young pregnant women, single mothers and their children
- counselling, advocacy and support
- linking to community supports
- outreach support
- parent education

The Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens (ZCAT) provides donations that include:

- Baby baths filled with all manner of baby requirements – clothes, toys, books, rugs, etc
- Hand-made rugs suitable for mothers and babies
- Furniture for inside and outside of units
- Crockery, cutlery, kitchen equipment
- Linen and cushions
- Toys and activities for children aged up to five years of age

This year we have had many people who have learned about our support for Malvern Place provide amazing donations. As we are linked with the Rotary Club of Adelaide Parks, they have also begun providing donations.

One of the wonderful things that began during the past year is that former ZCAT Shirley Lamb, a retired Home Economics teacher, began cooking lessons. She provided all of the ingredients and cooking containers as well as a range of printed recipes. This has enabled some of these women to learn ways to provide food on a budget.

Birthing Kit Assembly Day



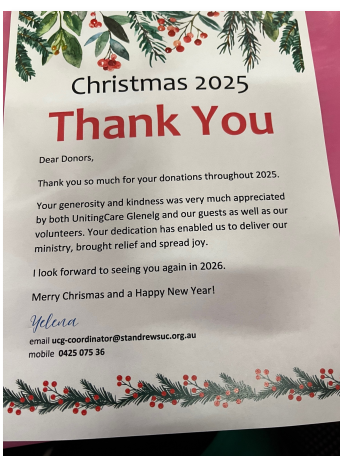

Supporting Midwifery and Nursing Students in DR Congo

In DR Congo, one of the poorest countries in the world, our club has built a long relationship with MHCD (Mission in Health Care and Development), a charity based at Luvungi, South Kivu Province. MHCD runs the only government accredited course in nursing and midwifery in South Kivu, a province of 5.7 million people. Some students attend on a scholarship arrangement which means they are assisted with student fees. However, they still face other obligatory costs such as uniforms and exams. Exams in years 1 to 3 cost \$25USD per year, then \$55USD in the final year. Endemic poverty and war mean these exam costs present a huge challenge and place enormous stress on the students and their families.

This year the Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens used \$580 AUD or about \$365USD to help pay the exam fees for final year midwifery students. This enabled the students to concentrate on their studies rather than looking for extracurricular work or pressuring families to cover their expenses. This financial stress was compounded in the last twelve months by the incursion of M23 rebels into the area. On graduation the midwives/nurses will be supported by MHCD to return to their communities and provide basic health services, including midwifery, in simple local clinics, giving them a sustainable career and providing health services in areas where previously none existed.

AFFLIP Annual Report

The Australian Foundation for Fostering Learning in the Philippines Inc. (AFFLIP) is a voluntary, non-government, not for profit Foundation based in South Australia. Their focus is on supporting the learning of students in poorly resourced schools which have a large number of educationally disadvantaged students. Currently they are working with 15 elementary public schools, with about 22,500 students, in Talomo District, Davao City, Mindanao, The Philippines.

The objects of the Foundation are to support:

- the provision of physical facilities and learning resources for identified schools in the Philippines;
- the planning and delivery of professional development programs for Filipino teachers and administrators;
- the development of greater global awareness for students and teachers in identified schools in the Philippines and in South Australia through mutual exchange;
- school communities in their efforts to reduce student hunger, illness, infections and malnourishment in identified Filipino schools; and
- students from poor families to attend school and access both formal and extracurricular school programs.
- the development of digital learning knowledge and skills for students and teachers.



The Zonta Club of Adelaide Torrens (ZCAT) provides funding to support girls with scholarships that enable them to continue their education beyond Year 3. The scholarship pays for school fees, books, uniforms, and extra curricula activities. We have donated these funds for the past ten years. All of our students, who have completed Year 7, have continued on to high school.

Camilla Louise Sustainable Fashion Events



Our Sustainable Fashion events align with the Zonta Says NOW to Gender-Equal Climate Action cause.

Zonta International envisions a world where every woman can achieve her full potential, has access to all resources, is represented in decision-making positions on an equal basis with men, and lives without fear of violence. By **taking gender-equal climate action now**, we can keep this vision alive.

Australians are now recycling or reusing 732 million items of clothing annually, yet 924 million garments (over 200,000 tonnes) are still sent to landfill. We need to drastically reduce waste at the source by penalising brands mass-producing incredibly cheap and poor-quality clothing. By styling recycled fashion thoughtfully, we are not just wearing clothes, we are sharing the story of sustainability and creativity.

We have had a fabulous year promoting sustainable fashion and, in the process, raising funds to support our club projects.

In the 2025-2026 year we hosted the following events:

1. "Orange the World" trading table at the Zonta SA Meeting

What an impact our racks of orange fashions made when delegates arrived at our Area Meeting. Our passion is to "orange the world" – and use orange to spread the message about Gender Based violence, not only during the 16 days campaign, but for the other 350 days in the year.

2. EcoThreads Sustainable Market – Walkerville City Council

The EcoThreads Market was not only a great fundraising opportunity, but more importantly it was a great community engagement/outreach opportunity and gave us the opportunity to build relationships with the Walkerville council and community. As a result of our presence numerous other stallholders donated items which were then passed onto the St Andrews by the Sea community.

3. "Sip & Shop" Spring High Tea

This year we again hosted a "Sip & Shop" event which engaged savvy shoppers in an extreme shopping extravaganza. Guests not only had an amazing selection of sustainable fashions to choose from but also enjoyed an indulgent afternoon tea in the beautiful "Brooklyn".

Finance

Over this year the club's income from snap jewellery and fashion sales was significantly higher than budget. Snap jewellery was very popular with attendees at the Zonta International Convention in Brisbane in June-July with sales exceeding \$3400 from the three days alone.

Theatre "Come from Away" and Rotary Sausage Sizzle partnerships have been very successful.

The club held four fashion events spread from June through to November with the main fundraiser event being the Camilla Louise Sip 'n' Shop event at the end of September. The healthy profit from this event was in part owing to it being a no-cost event with club members generously supplying food and raffle prizes, but also sales of tickets and fashions at this event netted close to \$5500 income, higher than in the previous years.

The club once again decided to re-invest the interest from our term deposit bequeathed by Joan Moller for a higher rate over 7 months. Another very beautiful gift from Joan was some of her gold jewellery and the money raised from its sale. The club decided part of the funds from the sale of this gold jewellery will support the Young Women in Leadership Award which was awarded in this last month of this Zonta year.
